The Adoption of Catherine Anne

Written in Three Parts

Birth Mother Adoptive Parents CHAC Case Worker

Part I: Birth Mother (Lisa)

"My parents divorced when I was ten, and my mother died when I was sixteen. I somehow completed high school last year, and began working two part-time jobs while living with my grandmother.

When I discovered I was pregnant, I knew that I could not properly care for a baby by myself. I also knew I could not burden my 83-year old grandmother with a child. It was painful to think about adoption, but my caseworker, Jane, helped me to consider my options.

When I met Mark and Karen, prospective adoptive parents, I began to feel hope. They were very loving and I could easily talk with them. Yet, I still was not sure. It was a hard decision.

Then, for a few short months, the birth father reentered my life. I was elated. I thought we would marry and keep the baby. During this time, Mark and Karen kept in touch. I could tell they genuinely cared about me, and not just the baby. This made all the difference.

When the birth father left me for the second time, I no longer had any doubts. It had finally become clear to me that Mark and Karen were the ones to raise my child."

Part 2: Adoptive Parents (Karen and Mark)

"The emotional roller coaster ride of infertility was tough on us individually and as a couple. However, after two years, we finally came to peace about our loss. And to our surprise, we discovered that we both wanted to adopt from Children's Hope.

Our caseworker, Jane, was the best, earning our trust as she skillfully guided us through the application process. And from there we began taking the center's great preparatory workshops knowing that the waiting process could take months or even years.

Six weeks later, we received a phone call to meet Lisa. We were excited and nervous at the same time. Little did we know what a strong connection would take place at those early meetings. Lisa was so intelligent and beautiful, inside and out. How could we not want to adopt her baby? She was so open about her struggle to do what was right for her child. We were also so deeply touched by the depth of her sacrifice.

Therefore, it was challenging when Lisa thought she would marry the birthfather and keep the baby. Although we were disappointed, we let go and trusted that the right baby would come in time. Meanwhile, we were happy for Lisa, and wanted her to know she had our full support.

Two months later, we received a surprise call from Jane. The birth father was not ready for a commitment, and Lisa had chosen us to be the adoptive parents. We could hardly speak through our tears."

Part 3: CHAC Case Worker (Jane)

"Every adoption is different. I am always humbled to serve in such an intimate and life-changing process.

In this case, I was so impressed with Lisa's courage. She was not afraid to explore her feelings and express herself, a hard thing to do when so much is at stake.

Mark and Karen were also impressive. They had such trust that the right baby would come to them. And they gave Lisa such unconditional love and understanding.

Currently Lisa is attending college in the evenings. She wants to become a social worker and help other birth mothers. I tell her she still has plenty of time to decide. But between you and me, I believe she would make a great one!"
